

Dear Village Church Friends:

I want to begin this note by asking you to think of a time

when you felt totally out of place or when you sensed you were emotionally lost. I am willing to guess that some of you think almost automatically about a time when you were in the hospital. I have visited people in the hospital and many seem lost and "out of it." I have been in the hospital twice in my adult life for knee replacement surgery. For most people the hospital environment and everything that is happening to them makes them feel uncomfortable and anxious. That's a natural feeling, because for most of us, a hospital is a very strange place and the staff work diligently to make us feel comfortable.

Now, go back and read Ezekiel 34 and the Prophet's powerful words. Instead of the formal repetition of "Thus says the Lord God." Ezekiel used words like "I myself." The first person pronoun "I" was used 13 times in the chapter. Instead of "the people of Israel" we find the personalized "my sheep" and "my people." The prophet also used active and powerful verbs: search,

rescue, bring, feed, tend, bind up, and strengthen.

The listeners of this Word of God were the Hebrews during the period of the exile. The leaders of the nation were held captive in a foreign land. The country had been destroyed. The people's cry to God was "what now, all is lost, ... and who cares anyway?"

The Shepherd cares! – was God's response. It is God – the Shepherd – who searches and rescues, who binds us and strengthens. God's message to those who were feeling desperately outside of the fold and outside of what would be called God's chosen people was "I will seek the lost, and I will bring back the strayed, and I will bind up the crippled, and strengthen the weak, and the fat and the strong I will watch over; I will feed them in justice."

To the "lostness" of our lives the Good News of Jesus Christ comes. God sent Jesus Christ into our world to reaffirm hope: "I am the good shepherd. know my own and my own know me, just as the Father knows me and I know the Father. And I lay down my life for the sheep. I have other sheep that do not belong to this fold. I must bring them also, and they will listen to my voice. So there will be one flock, one shepherd." (John 10:14-16)

During our Lenten Season may we all sense and come to a new affirmation that God cares through the Village Church, our Church family. God cares through you and me! It is God – the good shepherd – who searches and rescues, who binds up and strengthens. Our church family is here to receive people in need. Our church is here to accept and support people who have been weakened by life experiences. Our church is here to provide opportunities for people like you and me to reach out to another in need.

ASH WEDNESDAY
March 5, 7 p.m. in the Chapel



Ash Wednesday emphasizes a dual encounter: we confront our own mortality and confess our sin before God within the community of faith. The form and content of the service focus on the dual themes of sin and death in the light of God's redeeming love in Jesus Christ. The visual environment will be solemn and stark. Purple is the most traditional color throughout Lent. Rough, coarse textures such as burlap—sackcloth and ashes—suggest the character of the day and season.

The use of ashes as a sign of mortality and repentance has a long history in Jewish and Christian worship, and the Imposition of Ashes can be a powerful nonverbal and experiential way of participating in the call to repentance and reconciliation. The ashes may be mixed with a small amount of olive oil for Imposition of Ashes.

EXTEND A HELPING HAND TO THE HOMELESS

We are collecting sleeping bags, blankets, gently used clothing (shirts, pants & jackets), shoes (sneakers & boots), backpacks, tarps, hats, gloves, and socks for distribution to the homeless in surrounding communities. The items will be given to Mission for Hope, a non-profit organization established in 2018 by Leighton O'Connor, who is a resident of Nahant. Once a month, O'Connor and his team put the items in a Jeep or truck and drive to a specific location. Recently they made a stop outside My Brother's Table in Lynn. In addition to the items listed above, they also provide hygiene kits with money donated to the organization. If you'd like to participate in this way, you can send a check to the church (PO Box 77) with Mission of Hope in the memo line, or directly to Mission for Hope (20 Castle Road).

Donations of clothing, blankets, etc. may be dropped off starting March 1 through April 4. The church is open from 9-12 and 1-3 Monday through Thursday and from 9-12 on Fridays. The items will be picked up at the April 4th Nahant Community Breakfast which will feature a presentation by the founder of Mission for Hope Leighton O'Connor. Here's the skinny — Our profile to search for a Designated Term Pastor has been posted to the UCC website. Moderator Jen McCarthy has assembled a Search Committee that consists of Rex Antrim, Robin deStefanio, Lisa Haley, Christine Stevens, Beth Walls and herself. Several profiles had come in by press time. The Search Committee is reviewing each profile independently and together and preparing to start interviewing candidates.

A Designated Term Pastor is called to serve a church for a specific, predetermined period of time, usually with a defined purpose like church revitalization, or transition, and with the potential to be considered for a settled pastor position after the designated term is complete. We are looking to enter into a three-year agreement with the Designated Term Pastor. It is a process so please be patient and know that we'll keep you posted on the journey.

ZOOM WORSHIP SERVICES




